

**Notes of the observer:** A pair of individuals has been repeatedly observed throughout the spring of 2023, on 31<sup>st</sup> May the pair was observed with 4 chicks, confirming the suspects about their reproduction. Further monitoring in the following years will be vital

to determine if the species will continue breeding in

**Reason of interest:** This is the first reported breeding record of the species for Calabria.





# 3. Ruddy Shelduck Tadorna ferruginea

**Status:** Breeding

Site location: Pantano Ciaramiraro (Siracusa), Italy

Date of observation: 10<sup>th</sup> June 2023

**Reason of interest:** The species occasionally breeds in Italy but most breeding pairs are composed of individuals escaped from captivity or originating from populations naturalized in Europe. This is the first documented evidence of reproduction of a (likely) wild pair ever collected in Sicily.

# 4. Common Woodpigeon Columba palumbus

**Notes of the observer:** A chick found dead on 7<sup>th</sup> March 2020. Another chick observed on 26<sup>th</sup> March 2022, and a third, just fledged and along with an adult, on 14<sup>th</sup> February 2023.

Reason of interest: Very early breeding events.

#### 5. Water rail Rallus aquaticus and Coot Fulica atra

Date of observation: 22<sup>nd</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> December 2022

**Notes of the observer:** Both times the coots were foraged with bread near the bank. Once they took their piece of bread, they moved away from the crowd and sheltered in the reedbed, where they began to feed. The water rail, waiting in the reeds, stole their bread and then disappeared among

the reeds. Observed 4 "thefts" in 20 min on 22<sup>nd</sup> December at 9.10 and 2 "thefts" in 15 min on 26<sup>th</sup>

December at 12.20.

Reason of interest: Interesting kleptoparasitic

behaviour.

Notes of the observers: During a bird ringing session, we observed along a path three chicks fed by an

adult.

**Reason of interest:** First confirmed breeding event for the species in Oasi LIPU Cave Gaggio Nord since

1985.

# 7. Scopoli's Shearwater Calonectris diomedea

Date of observation: 31st March 2023

**Notes of the observers:** The individual was found dead in the center of Babbucce (5 km from the Adriatic Coast). It probably had been driven inland by the strong gale force winds (between 70 and 80 km/h) on the Adriatic Sea, reaching the mainland exhausted. Individual recovered from the Marches Wild Animal Rescue Centre.

**Reason of interest:** The Scopoli's Shearwater is considered regular migrant and partial wintering for

Marches region and irregular migrant and irregular wintering for the Pesaro-Urbino province; in Abruzzo region the species is a regular migrant and irregular wintering species. This is the first record of the species for inland Central Adriatic Italy.

#### 8. African Sacred Ibis Threskiornis aethiopicus

Date of observation: 18th April 2023

Notes of the observers: Two African Sacred Ibis, part of a group of five, approached a Pied Avocet *Recurvirostra avosetta* nest. One of the Pied Avocets tried to drive them out, but was eventually forced to move away. One of the Ibises hit the brooding Avocet on the head, making it stand up. The Avocet attempted to deal with the attack, but while one Ibis kept it distance, the other grabbed the egg in her beak and threw it into the air, resulting in it breaking on the ground. Then, the Ibises ate the contents of the egg and then also the shell.

**Reason of interest:** Despite the African Sacred Ibis, an invasive alien species, is widely considered a threat for other bird species, since it could feed on their eggs and chicks, documented evidence of predation on nests in their non-native range are still scant.



Notes of the observers: The individual has his left limb amputated, the lesion and age are compatible with the individual observed on 23<sup>rd</sup> October 2022 in Turin. During the period of staying, data on the moult and on the diet were collected on a weekly basis. The individual was in active moulting of flight feathers and body feathers. During the 12 days of observation, 48 foraging actions were recorded, 13 of which were on cockroaches. The others were on unidentified floating organic material. Thanks to

Vincenzo Cavaliere and Marco D'Errico for sharing the photos.

**Reason of interest:** Interesting documentation of the moult and diet of this migrant, irregular for Italy.







# 12. Yellow-legged Gull Larus michahellis

**Site location:** Industrial Area north of Ponte Metauro, 650 m from the Adriatic Sea, Fano (Pesaro-Urbino),

Italy

Date of observation: June 2023

Notes of the observers: A little colony of 6-8 pairs of Yellow-legged Gulls, located on the roof of an industrial building (8 m high). The roof is made of sloping panels, with dividing corridors covered with gravel, where the gulls have nested. Each nest is ca. 10 m apart. The colony is 1300 m from a Recycling Center, a place used throughout the year and from many years by the gulls for trophic activity. It's probable that the colony was more extensive, also occupying the roofs of others industrial buildings in the same area.

**Reason of interest:** There are a few Yellow-legged Gull colonies in Marches region. The first confirmed nesting of the species in the Marches region dates back to 2006, along the coast of Conero (Ancona). In 2015 in the city of Ancona there were about 15 pairs.

**Notes of the observers:** Immature individual observed, photographed and filmed with a smartphone at 8 - 10 m from the dinghy.

**Reason of interest:** Species rarely observed in southern Italy.



#### 14. Little Owl Athene noctua

**Notes of the observer:** Due to a heavy hailstorm the previous day, tens of heron nestlings have fallen from the nest and die on the ground. A debilitated (probably because of the hailstorm) Little Owl has been observed perched on a dead Gray Heron Ardea cinerea nestling, plucking its back.

**Reason of interest:** It is unknown how frequent is scavenging by Owls. Very few records of scavenging by Little Owls are reported.



# 15. Long-eared Owl Asio otus

Notes of the observers: At least three chicks were

observed and their calls were recorded near the police station

A further observation of an adult Long-eared Owl was made in the island (42.364650; 10.915232) on the 7<sup>th</sup> May 2018, therefore at

least one pair breeds in Giglio island.

**Reason of interest:** The species is considered a very rare breeder in the Tuscan archipelago and this is the first

confirmed breeding for Giglio island.

# 16. Eastern Imperial Eagle Aquila heliaca

**Reason of interest:** Regular during pre- and postbreeding migrations in Sicily, where some individuals also stop annually to spend the winter. In the vast majority of reports, these are juveniles on their first migration or dispersing immatures; very rarely, as in this case, complete adults (6<sup>th</sup> year onwards) are observed.

# 17. Western Marsh-harrier Circus aeruginosus

**Site location:** Internal area of SPA, SAC IT3250016 "Cave di Marcon", Oasi LIPU Cave Gaggio Nord,

Date of observation: from 23th March to 15th July

2023

**Notes of the observers:** During the breeding community monitoring, we observed the pair mating; we found a nest in the reedbed with 5 nestlings (drone pic taken on 27<sup>th</sup> May 2023). At the end, 3 juveniles fledged at the beginning of July (first direct observation of juvenils on 5<sup>th</sup> July). The reproductive success was 0.6.

**Reason of interest:** For the second consecutive year a pair of Western Marsh Harriers nested successfully in Oasi LIPU Cave Gaggio Nord.



# 18. Western Marsh-harrier Circus aeruginosus

**Notes of the observers:** A young of Western Marsh Harrier, while flying over a saltpan, jumped and caught a Gilt-head Bream *Sparus aurata* of the presumed weight of a quarter of a kilogram.

Reason of interest: The presence of fish in the diet

of this species is occasionally reported in literature based on the analysis of the pellets, without any direct evidence of predation.

**Reason of interest:** This is an uncommon behaviour, and there is only one reported case in the literature.

**Notes of the observer:** In 2022, in a period of intense heat, an individual was observed on 3 occasions breaking a plastic bottle full of water for drinking. This behaviour has been observed again in 2023, later also performed by a Magpie *Pica pica*.

**Reason of interest:** Interesting observation of a Hooded Crow repeatedly using objects of anthropic origin (plastic bottles) to achieve a goal (drink). Acquisition of the observed behaviour by a Magpie.

Reason of interest: Long stay at the same site.

**Site location:** Bari, Italy (41.106528; 16.865611)

Date of observation: 3rd February 2023

Notes of the observer: I observed an individual in a small green space in Bari. It was foraging on the ground and in a small Oleander bush, and allowed me to get very close to it without interrupting its foraging behaviour. The observation is interesting to me, as observations of Common Whitethroats in the winter in Italy appear to be very scarce and mostly concentrated in the last days of February and the first weeks of March.

**Reason of interest:** The Common Whitethroat is a normally fully-migratory species in Europe, with a very few observations in winter.

As soon as I approached to it, it flew away toward south, following the river course through bank vegetation. Sonogram made by Luca Giussani is attached, who helped me together with Alessandro Pavesi with the identification of the bird. I also thank Alessandro Gementi for the plant identification.

**Reason of interest:** This is the first confirmed observation of this species for the Piacenza province. In addition, the species is considered vagrant for the nearby Cremona province.
